I tried to get in touch with you before I left town. I want to keep you informed on a project that I hope will get off the ground for Fall.

I have talked to Clair Weinstein and Paul Kelley and to Rudy de la Garza of the Mexican American Studies Center. We have our lowest retention rate among Mexican American students. Part of their trouble, of course, is communication; and if we could do more for them in freshman English, we might be able to keep more of them.
